Let the Truth Be Told

Paul would understand exactly what it's like to be called to an apostolic ministry

directed at the revival of the church and nation of Haiti:

"We think you ought to know, dear brothers and sisters, about the trouble we went through in (Haiti). We were crushed and overwhelmed beyond our ability to endure, and we thought we would never live through it. In fact, we expected to die. But as a result, we stopped relying on ourselves and learned to rely only on God, who raises the dead. And he did rescue us from mortal danger, and he will rescue us again. We have placed our confidence in him, and he will continue to rescue us. And you are helping us by praying for us. Then many people will give thanks because God has graciously answered so many prayers for our safety" (2 Cor 1:8-11 NLT).

Heaven

If you are following our ministry on Facebook (facebook.com/haitirevival), you know we are on a path led by the Holy Spirit. ***Mentoring pastors and ministry students, teaching missionaries and Haitians, drawing worship leaders and musicians to a higher level, creating prayer movements, transforming children spiritually, partnering with those to whom the Lord miraculously introduces us, creating revival curriculum and translating worship songs.*** We're seeing the fruit of obedience to the clear call of God.

Many of our greatest moments are the individuals (both Haitians and expats) who stop at our home and end up in life-transforming prayer and renewed life direction. I know we're doing exactly what we see the Father doing, following Him in His ministry, faithful and obedient servants of Jesus Christ.

We have close relationships with friends both light and dark skinned, including many missionaries that live in our neighborhood. Certainly a deeper fellowship with the Body of Christ than perhaps we have ever known! We call Haiti our home now, and would not want to be anywhere else.

Hell

This is a dangerous place. Physically. People have been murdered on the street within a block of our house. Gangs of HIV infected youth were breaking into homes and raping men and women at gunpoint without stealing anything. Lately, because of corruption during presidential pre-elections, groups of up to 3,000 can gather on the streets wielding machetes, guns, and rocks to destroy cars and injure people.

Jealousy is a cultural stronghold here. It causes some to put vaudou curses on

others who have one dollar more. People report lies to police causing others to be falsely imprisoned, and it happens to both Haitians and Americans.

Then there's the constant reports coming from the US. I grew up all my life in a country where I knew, "If the world falls to pieces, I live in the safest place." I often feel now that we are safer in Haiti. We live on Social Security, which can no longer be called "security." Meanwhile, many of our ministry supporters are getting old, retiring, losing jobs, so what we need to do the work we're called to do keeps diminishing.

Daily life here means constant car repairs that cost 2-3 times more than in the US. I'm paying \$400/month to get nine hours/day of electricity. We pay a monthly water bill, but the water flows into our cistern only about 10 hours/week, which means we still have to buy trucks of water. Inverters, batteries, generators, solar panels means more upkeep and repairs. Our gasoline is still close to \$4/gallon. Our rent is \$1,000/month.

Personally, I have never thought of myself as an easily frightened person. But for the first time in my life, at age 65, I waken in the night with numb hands and feet, shortness of breath, racing heart. Nothing physically is wrong; it's a panic attack. It can happen day or night. I get up and pray Psalms out loud to God until I can breathe again. It makes me angry at myself because I'm a man of faith. If the worst happens, I have paradise just the blink of an eye away! But who can explain what's really going on inside us?

Honesty

SO...as we approach the end of another year, I have some essential requests I'd like to place before you:

1) PRAY:

- For the peace and security we can only have in Jesus to rule our lives.
- For supernatural anointing to serve God in His ministry of reviving a weak church into power and purpose that it might lay spiritual foundations for a transformed nation.

2) GIVE AN END OF THE YEAR GIFT:

- We need **\$850 for vehicle rotors and springs.**
- We've had no vacation for two years. We need family time and rest away from

the daily difficulties of Haiti. I've planned a trip to Ft. Lauderdale for 3 free nights end of December. It would be so helpful if gifts so designated could pay the **\$1,200 airfare**.

3) BEGIN MONTHLY GIVING:

As I said, nearly all our personal expenses are covered by Social Security. But to do the ministry to which we are called, we need to be able to fill the gas tank often. We need to publish and print materials for pastors and leaders, music and songbooks for musicians and churches, house and feed groups who gather in conferences we lead, purchase office supplies at much higher prices, and be ready to say yes without hesitation when the Lord puts a need or ministry on our heart. Any regular amount you can commit each month can help set us free to do all we're commissioned and equipped to do in serving God here.
